





To deliver on our brand promises, Premier and Heyob's Winter Diesel Strategies involve a commitment from every person on our team to ensure that our fuels are performing at their best.

All diesel fuels contain wax, and below a certain temperature, will undergo changes such as crystallization or gelling. These changes reduce the ability of the diesel fuel to flow, and can also create filter plugging, adversely affecting the operability of vehicles.

- Proper tank management can be the difference between business as usual and engines that won't start. You can count on Premier and Heyob to keep your tank and fuel clean of debris so that when you pick up the nozzle you know you will be getting the fuel and results you expect.



Premier Companies' employees Matt Bense, Tiffany Lane and Jonathan Lane helped build two homes with Habitat for Humanity at the 2016 Indiana State Fair.

Greater Indy Habitat for Humanity has hosted a building project for seven consecutive years at the Indiana State Fair. Each year, a team of volunteers, representing Indiana's agriculture community, builds homes from floor to roof in just 14 days.

Volunteers dedicated more than 4,000 hours for future homeowners Danielle Cox-Eland, and Marcus Lewis and Landonia Malone.

Both families completed more than 300 hours of sweat equity, including financial and home maintenance classes, and hours spent helping to build their home and other Habitat homes.

Future homeowner, Danielle Cox-Eland, described what an affordable home will mean to her family: "Being a homeowner means so much more than just physically owning a house. It is a sense of security for my family, stability, pride and an overwhelming happiness that I'm given the opportunity to be a homeowner and change my lifestyle at the same time. I want to be a role model for my children, showing them that dedication, good work ethic, and pursuing your dreams pays off."

Indiana State Fair attendees were able to see the building progress on a daily basis and tour the homes in the final stages of construction.

On Friday, August 19, 2016, Habitat hosted a home dedication at the Fairgrounds for all sponsors, volunteers and Indiana State Fair visitors. After each home was dedicated to the family, the houses were moved to permanent locations in the Near North and Mapleton-Fall Creek neighborhoods.

BRING MODERN AGRICULTURE *To Life*

The WinField Crop Adventure is an interactive educational exhibit that engages people of all ages

Today's farmers are facing the daunting challenge of producing enough food to support a rapidly growing global population. To help the public better understand the evolving technology and science that is pivotal to sustainably increasing food production, WinField (of which Premier is part owner) is partnering with Fair Oaks Farms in Fair Oaks, Ind., to create the WinField Crop Adventure. The exhibit informs visitors about the science, agronomic practices and technologies that shape modern farming.

According to the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, global food production must increase by 70 percent to feed a projected population of 9.1 billion people in 2050. This is a well-known fact within the agriculture industry; however, satisfying this demand is only part of the production challenge: There

is little land available to add to existing farmland, and water demand is projected to outstrip supply by 40 percent by 2030. Simply put, the agriculture industry needs to produce more food with fewer resources, and do so with minimal environmental impact.

FAR FROM THE FARM

At a time when the agriculture industry is undergoing considerable transformation, 98 percent of Americans are not directly connected to where their food comes from. This detachment from the farm leaves many people with misconceptions about how food is produced.

BRINGING MODERN AGRICULTURE INTO FOCUS

The WinField Crop Adventure shares the modern agriculture story with people of all ages. As visitors



tour the exhibit, they learn about not only the history of farming, but today's practices and how agriculture might look in the future. The exhibit is highly interactive and technology-driven experience, with videos, touchscreen displays, interactive puzzles and games that demonstrate the science behind farming — from insects in the field to satellites in outer space. Displays include information, images and other assets from Purdue University's College of Agriculture.

"With so much of the public removed from the farm, Purdue Agriculture is excited to work with WinField and Fair Oaks Farms to help visitors learn about modern agriculture and to enhance the public's understanding of farming today and in the future," said Jay Akridge, Glenn W. Sample Dean of Agriculture at Purdue University.

The WinField Crop Adventure will join The Dairy Adventure and The Pig Adventure, which are already available to guests of Fair Oaks Farms.



CARING FOR THE PIGS

Pig farming is a 365-day job, and the responsibility of animal care is shared by each individual involved in farming – from owners, to managers, animal caretakers, and the drivers who transport the pigs. There is a misconception that big, modern farms are less humane compared with the smaller farms of the past. The opposite is true. Huge strides in farm design, animal handling practices and veterinary medicine have enhanced pigs' health and comfort. Today, farmers, in collaboration with veterinarians and other agricultural experts, are more knowledgeable and better equipped than ever before to effectively care for the health and well-being of their pigs.

Farmers' commitment to continuously improve practices has resulted in better methods in many areas of pig farming. Continue reading to the right to learn how practices have evolved over time.



Housing

Inconsistent: indoors and outdoors.
Vulnerable to extreme weather, injury, predators and illness.

Indoors: reduce incidence of illness and injury; protected from predators; enhanced environmental comfort year round.

Health Mgmt.

Treated pigs in response to disease and illness.

Many approaches to prevent, control and mitigate risk for animal illness and disease; better identification and treatment of individual sick animals.

Odor Control

Few standardized methods to control odors.

Awareness and prevention such as dust management and vegetative windbreaks to mitigate spread of farm odors; better manure management.

Hog Characteristics

Smaller, higher fat content. Average 200 pounds with 2.86 inches of back fat.

Larger and leaner. Average 270 pounds with 0.75 inches of back fat.

Feed/Diet/Nutrition

Largely unregulated diet including grass, clover and even table scraps.

Strictly regimented rations including corn and soybean meal with added vitamins and minerals. Better administration of proper nutrition equitably distributed.

Nutrient Mgmt.

Little manure containment and reuse; uncertain disposal.

Sophisticated systems to capture, control and use manure as fertilizer.

Providing safe, wholesome food is our most important responsibility. Ensuring pork food safety is a complex undertaking that requires awareness of the role that everyone plays in the food chain. On the farm, many factors can affect the safety of pork, which is why today's farming operations employ a wide variety of technology and techniques to minimize food safety threats. Modern practices, such as raising pigs indoors and closely monitoring all aspects of biosecurity have vastly improved today's pork in terms of safety and quality. Checks and balances help ensure the integrity and security of the food supply at every step in the process. The U.S. food supply chain has earned a global reputation for the safety of its products, and governmental oversight is part of the reason for this success. Federal, state and local entities contribute to our nation's food security safety net through regulation and inspection. 

THE ROADWAYS THIS FALL

The harvest season is fast approaching, which means drivers can expect more traffic on rural roads. To kick off the busy time of year, national officials are urging people to take it slow on the roads.

Harvest season generally brings a time when there is an increase in collisions between farm equipment and other vehicles. Vehicle collisions are often the result of the speed differential between slower-moving farm equipment and passenger cars and trucks. Many times passenger vehicle drivers simply don't have enough time to react if they do not recognize the farm equipment soon enough.

THE NATIONAL EDUCATION CENTER FOR AGRICULTURE SAFETY RECOMMENDS THAT DRIVERS ABIDE BY THE FOLLOWING RULES ON RURAL ROADS:

DRIVERS


- 1 REDUCE** speed when you see farm equipment on rural roads.
- 2 ALLOW** for short closing distances when approaching slow moving vehicles.
- 3 BRAKE** for orange and red reflective triangles that warn of slow moving vehicles.
- 4 Keep SAFE DISTANCE** behind farm equipment so farmers can see you.
- 5 YIELD** to wide equipment on narrow roads.

THE NECAS RECOMMENDS THAT FARMERS DO THE FOLLOWING BEFORE TRAVELING ON PUBLIC ROADS:

FARMERS

- 1 LOCK** brake pedals.
- 2 ADJUST** mirrors for good vision
- 3** Make sure that all warning flashers, lights, and slow moving vehicle emblems are in proper **OPERATING** condition, clean, and easily visible. If they are covered with dust, wipe them off before leaving the field.
- 4 CHECK** tire inflation pressures. Inflate the tires to the maximum recommended pressure for long-distance travel.

Rural road rage can be negated if everyone takes the responsibility to have extra patience, careful driving habits, and use high-visibility markings and lighting.
